Subject: IMPROVING CONNECTIONS BETWEEN NORTHALLERTON HIGH STREET

AND THE PRISON SITE

1.0 PURPOSE AND BACKGROUND:

1.1 This report provides an update to the report presented to February 2017 Cabinet and seeks authority to promote the final plans with key stakeholders for implementation.

- 1.2 In June 2016 consultants, Gillespies, were asked to undertake a high level appraisal of all the east-west connections that exist between the High Street and the prison site. In order to maximise the economic potential of the re-development of the prison site and the relocation of the North Yorkshire Police Headquarters to Alverton Court the connectivity between these sites and the town centre needs to be inviting and easily accessible to pedestrians.
- 1.3 Following consideration of the proposals at February Cabinet, Gillespies were asked to provide detailed designs and costings for the three preferred routes for improvement which are; Zetland Street and the alleys of New Row and Central Arcade. Copies of the detailed designs and visualisations of the proposals have been placed in the Members Lounge for information.

2.0 PROPOSALS:

2.1 **Zetland Street**

The Zetland Street proposal attached at Annex A seeks to provide a legible pedestrian friendly connection which includes:

- formalising loading bays, disabled parking and bus stops
- reducing the route to a single carriage way
- increased pavement widths
- improving the environment with better quality materials
- introducing some planting and landscaping

The area to be improved is all public highway and therefore in NYCC ownership. Additionally improvements to shop fronts have been developed in the final report as an illustration of what could be achieved, though it is anticipated these improvements would be private sector led.

2.2 New Row and Central Arcade

Improvement schemes for New Row and Central Arcade attached at Annex B, have been developed following approval by the local Members that these should be the principle alleyway routes to be improved. The proposals include:

- improved surface treatments
- quality treatments to the entrances of the routes to encourage their use
- replacement of boundary walls to be reconstructed with higher quality traditional materials in keeping with the conservation area.

These areas are in private ownership and management.

2.3 Other Alleyways

Improvements are included for further alleyways with high level improvement suggestions to provide a framework for improvements should other parties wish to take forward wider improvements.

2.4 It is hoped that now the schemes have been developed in detail that they will attract external funding.

3.0 LINK TO COUNCIL PRIORITIES:

- 3.1 This links to the re-development of the Prison Site which is identified as a key project under the Councils priority of delivering economic growth in the Council Plan 2015-19.
- 3.2 The continued vibrancy of the town and maximising its economic potential supports the Vibrant Market Towns priority theme of the Councils Economic Strategy 2014-24 'Hambleton A Place to Grow'.

4.0 RISK ASSESSMENT:

4.1 Risks associated with not approving the recommendations.

5.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

- 5.1 The estimated cost of the schemes is attached at Annex C.
- 5.2 Delivery costs of the improvement proposals will be sought from external sources. A bid for LEP Local Growth Deal Round 3 has been submitted together with a submission to the National Productivity Investment Fund (NPIF) managed by NYCC which aims to support projects which improve local road networks and maintain infrastructure in market towns.
- 5.3 The Business & Economy team will continue to work to identify other possible sources of funding and work in partnership with key stakeholders including the Northallerton BID and NYCC to progress the scheme.

6.0 **LEGAL IMPLICATIONS**:

- 6.1 The Council does not own any of the routes to be improved. Ownership will need to be established and land owners consent gained.
- 6.2 Consents to undertake works in the Highway will need to be gained before improvements are undertaken.

7.0 EQUALITY/DIVERSITY ISSUES:

7.1 All improvement scheme proposals will be fully accessible to ensure there are no equality and diversity issues.

8.0 **RECOMMENDATIONS**:

- 8.1 It is recommended that:
 - 1) The Council promotes the improvement schemes with North Yorkshire County Council, land owners and other key stakeholders
 - 2) The Council works with key stakeholders to secure funding for implementation of the schemes
