Subject: ENCOURAGING EMPLOYERS TO GET YOUNG PEOPLE INTO WORK

1.0 PURPOSE AND BACKGROUND:

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to seek approval in principle to develop a scheme to encourage employers in Hambleton to get young people into work and to commit £100,000 as a one-off revenue fund for the scheme from the Service Improvement Reserve.
- 1.2 There are currently 253 Hambleton residents aged 18-24 claiming Jobseekers allowance, with 81 of these residents claiming the allowance for over 26 weeks. Given this position and the Council's priority of supporting local economic growth, the Council has an opportunity to work with local businesses and other partners, such as Jobcentre Plus and the Local Enterprise Partnership, to develop a scheme which will encourage the private sector in Hambleton to take young people into work.
- 1.3 The scheme will examine the role the Council can play with young people through apprenticeships as well as supporting small local businesses with wage subsidies.

2.0 DECISIONS SOUGHT:

2.1 To approve in principle the development of a scheme and to commit £100,000 as a one-off fund from the Service Improvement Reserve.

3.0 LINK TO CORPORATE PRIORITIES:

3.1 One of the Council's Partnership priorities is to support local economic growth. By getting young people into employment and training and supporting businesses to do this, the Council will be directly supporting economic growth within the Hambleton district.

5.1 Through the provision of direct support to small businesses, the Council is able to have a positive impact on reducing the levels of youth unemployment within the district, breaking the cycle of dependency on benefits and creating a stronger more sustainable local economy within the private sector whilst the public sector contracts.

7.0 **LEGAL IMPLICATIONS:**

7.1 The wage subsidy element of the scheme will need to comply with the criteria for Employment Aid contained within the EU State Aid, General Block Exemption Regulations. This will be researched as part of the scheme.

8.1 Creating work and training opportunities for young unemployed people in Hambleton, should have a positive impact on the reduction of crime and disorder within the district.

9.0 EQUALITY/DIVERSITY ISSUES:

9.1 The scheme will have a positive impact on young people by getting them into employment. A wider impact assessment will be made if required through the development of the scheme.

10.0 **RECOMMENDATIONS:**

- 10.1 The Cabinet support the principle of:
 - (a) The development of the scheme in collaboration with other relevant partners and
 - (b) The commitment of a one-off fund of £100,000 from the Service Improvement Reserve.
