Subject: INGS LANE TRAVELLERS' SITE - ACTION PLAN

1.0 PURPOSE AND BACKGROUND:

- 1.1 This report sets out a plan to deal with the existing unauthorised developments at Ings Lane and to stop new breaches involving residential uses in order to prevent circumstances with the site becoming worse. A plan of the site is included as Annex 1.
- 1.2 The whole site was formerly in agricultural use but was divided into a number of pony paddocks in 2006, these have changed ownership repeatedly and some have been bought by traveller families. Currently there are 12 plots, however, through the sub-division of existing plots and the creation of new plots on land currently used as paddocks to the east, there is the possibility that more plots could be created.
- 1.3 There is a complex and lengthy planning and enforcement history to the site. There are unauthorised developments on all the plots with the exception of 4 and 10. There are unauthorised residential uses on 5 plots 1, 3, 6 (to be confirmed), 11 and 12.
- 1.4 In 2006 and 2007 Temporary Stop Notices and Enforcement Notices were served on plots 2, 3, 5, 6, 8 and 9 for operational development such as excavations, importing materials to raise land levels, amenity and storage buildings and hard-standings. The Enforcement Notices for plots 2, 3, 5 and 6 were upheld at appeal, however, no further action was taken and subsequently there has been further unauthorised developments on many of the plots.
- 1.5 Enforcement action was taken in 2012 against 2 residential uses (plots 1 and 11) and appeals against Enforcement Notices were dismissed in November 2012 and March 2013. In the most recent appeal decision issued on 8 March relating to plot 11 the Inspector concluded that granting planning permission would cause an unacceptable loss of highway safety and that the site access with the B1257 is so hazardous that it puts users of the site as well as other highway users at persistent and serious risk of accident. The decision on plot 1 also cited highway safety as a reason for dismissing the appeal and upholding the Enforcement Notice.

2.0 A STRATEGY FOR THE SITE:

2.1 Having won 2 appeals involving residential use in succession and the access having been found to be dangerous by both planning Inspectors the Council should now move to deal with the whole site expeditiously. The history of the site demonstrates that if action is not taken there is a strong probability that there will be further breaches of planning control involving the stationing of caravans for residential use on other plots which would have an unacceptable impact on highway safety.

- 2.2 A plan has been drawn up to deal with all the current breaches and to prevent more people coming to the site; this is set out in detail in Annex 2 and is summarised below. The plan is comprehensive, in the sense of dealing with the whole site, but because of the highway danger it prioritises actions to deal with the current and potential residential uses first.
- 2.3 The plan contains a range of different types of measure; an injunction, prosecutions and further Enforcement Notices. An injunction to prevent the siting of caravans for residential use on the areas of land where there is currently no such use is a main element of the strategy.

- 2.4 Implementing the strategy would be preceded by letters to owners and occupiers setting out the Council's intention to take action unless the earlier Enforcement Notices are complied with. Where possible the letters of intent would be supplemented by face to face explanations to ensure that the Council's intentions have been properly communicated to those affected and that the Council is fully aware of any personal circumstances that should be taken into account.
- 2.5 The Housing Team would need to be involved in respect of any responsibilities for rehousing and to provide advice on housing options.
- 2.6 There will also be a need for the Enforcement Team to make detailed and repeated checks to confirm the latest position with previously identified or alleged breaches of planning control on each plot ahead of the proposed actions. This work may necessitate changes to the detail in the Action Plan.
- 2.7 Alongside the actions at Ings lane the Council must continue to work to identify suitable sites elsewhere in the District to meet the accommodation needs of gypsies and travellers. The Traveller Housing Needs Study 2012 evidences a need for sites and the proposed actions at Ings Lane could displace the travellers affected to other unauthorised sites in Hambleton.

3.0 RISK ASSESSMENT:

4.0 FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

4.1 Approving the strategy will have costs for the Council. Expert legal support will be needed to maximise the chances of success with the Injunction and at Enforcement Inquiries and provide additional legal capacity on prosecutions. The estimated costs for dealing with the priority actions 1 to 3 assuming that the additional Enforcement Notices result in Public Inquiries which require external support are:

Injunction £10,000 Enforcement Action £10,000 Prosecutions £5,000 £25,000

4.2 A further report will be submitted should there be a need for additional resources.

5.0 LEGAL IMPLICATIONS:

5.1 An application for an injunction must follow the Court Procedure Rules. The Council has obtained legal advice that there is a reasonable prospect of an injunction succeeding because of the danger associated with residential traffic using the Ings Lane/B1257 junction. However, an injunction would be unlikely to succeed in respect of plots already in residential use; where Enforcement Notices are in place the Courts would view them as an effective remedy and where they are not in place, the Courts would expect other enforcement options to be exhausted before considering an injunction. These considerations are less likely to apply to plots not currently in residential use as there are no occupiers with rights and needs to be considered.

6.0 **EQUALITIES ISSUES:**

6.1 Responding to the housing needs of Gypsies and Travellers by identifying suitable sites for them (paragraph 2.7) is a means of tackling the inequalities experienced and helping to improve their circumstances.

7.0 **RECOMMENDATIONS:**

- 7.1 It is recommended that:-
 - (1) the proposed strategy at Annex 2 for dealing with current and apprehended breaches of planning control at Ings Lane be approved;
 - the Council applies to the Court for an injunction to prevent unauthorised residential uses on the areas identified in the strategy;
 - (3) £25,000 be allocated for implementing actions 1 to 3 in the strategy from the "one-off" fund.


